



## Incense Burner Lid

### Date

ca. 600-900

### Primary Maker

Maya (archaeological culture)

### Medium

pottery and paint

### Description

There were many different types of incense burners in Classic Maya society, perhaps as a result of the large selection of resin incense available in the Maya tropics. This interesting piece is the lid to a large vessel that would have allowed billowing clouds of smoke to swirl up and around the image of a woman holding an infant deer. Maya women allowed deer to graze upon their gardens and may have even planted small plots of corn just for these semi-domesticated animals. Deer were economically important and provided one of the few

sources of animal protein in the Classic Maya diet.
