## Description

Mace heads have been called "art-weapons" and "arttools" because they channeled symbolic information via a utilitarian form. Very common in high status graves, they

are tied to the emergence of a ruling class dependent upon agricultural intensification and territorial land claims. The anthropomorphic face of this mace head suggests characteristics of both a human and a monkey, and it may represent a shaman in the process of transformation from human to spirit form. It also shows a very strong similarity to the jaguar mace head, which suggests that they were made by the same artist or were part of the same grave. Together, they demonstrate a social transition during this time period, in which a greater reliance upon powerful people rather than dependence on the natural world determined the prosperity of the group.
